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

Child-Centered Therapy

Intensive Behavioral Health Services (IBHS) delivers trauma-informed, holistic ABA for children (under 21) and families.

We Focus On

• Strengthening families in understanding their children's behavioral communications.

• Personal strengths in plan formation and intervention.

We Offer

• Traditional intensive behavioral health services

- Trauma-informed ABA (Applied Behavior Analysis) services
- Trauma-informed individual therapeutic services
- Private pay options for ADOS.

• Private pay options for psychological testing.

 Customized trainings surrounding autism mental health trauma and DEI across schools, community providers, health care workers, and faith communities.

• Free BCBA field work and clinical licensure supervision.

The IBHS Team

Behavior Analysts use ABA techniques to develop a plan to help decrease negative target behaviors and replace them with more appropriate behaviors.

Behavioral Consultants (BC) work with the caregivers to develop goals and interventions to meet the child's specific needs.

Mobile Therapists (MT) utilize a strengthsbased approach to counseling, which is both child-related and family focused.

Behavioral Health Technicians (BHT) provide one-on-one support to the child and caregiver based upon interventions developed by the team.



Goals of Intensive Behavioral Health Services

- Maintaining children and teenagers in their own communities and encouraging participation.
- Focusing on personal strengths in plan formation and intervention.
- Utilizing a variety of community support systems.
- Encouraging "teamwork" so that the child, parents and treatment team are working together.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the program, care recipients must be under the age of 21. They must also have a MH or Autism diagnosis, be eligible for the receipt of medical assistance, and obtain a written order from either a doctor (PCP), Psychiatrist, or other clinically licensed professional who is enrolled in the Medicaid program, and who is recommending the medical necessity of Intensive Behavioral Health Services.
